- Plan, organize and carry through on a challenging project.

## The Rules

- It can't be any larger than 18 inches x 18 inches x 18 inches.
- You must work from a plan distributed by the event planning committee.
- You must do all the construction yourself.
- You can't use a kit.
- Your name and county need to be on a small piece of tape attached to your project.
