

During the past two years, we have worked together on several projects, such as the tolerance of chicory to preplant, preemergence and postemergence herbicides, multiflora rose management tactics, Cherokee sedge control options in hayfields, knotroot foxtail management in bermudagrass forages, the impact of herbicide treatments on fence wire longevity, and herbicide treatments to reclaim overgrown fences.


